





Supporting Children With Conflicts

Children often need to be taught specific social emotional skills when they enter a school setting. Teaching children to recognize and identify their emotions can be a first step toward preventing conflict in the classroom. Providing them with social scripts or possible solutions to use in negotiating relationships can also be very helpful in running a smooth classroom.

An <u>Emotion Poster</u> can act as a visual reminder when children are trying to express feelings.

A <u>Solution Kit</u> can help children work through conflicts or provide other choices for children when interacting with each other.

Many social conflicts can be <u>enacted</u> with puppets and role play where the children propose alternative solutions and ways to resolve conflict. Classroom <u>visual</u>
